Here, canals run through towns and fields, the Ria de Aveiro is full of life, and the Moliceiro Boat is a long, colorful boat that has glided through these waters for a very long time.

The Aveiro Region has 11 municipalities: Aveiro, Águeda, Albergaria-a-Velha, Anadia, Estarreja, Ílhavo, Murtosa, Oliveira do Bairro, Ovar, Sever do Vouga, and Vagos.

But there are six special places with a deep connection to the Moliceiro Boat: Murtosa, Ílhavo, Vagos, Estarreja, Aveiro, and Ovar.

In these towns, you can visit old piers, shipyards where the moliceiros are built, museums full of amazing stories, and trails where nature is all around you.

This is where tradition is still alive.

Master boatbuilders still shape moliceiros by hand. The painted panels tell old-time tales. And the sails still dance in the wind.





What was the Moliceiro Boat used for?

A long time ago, farmers in the Aveiro Region used something called molico (sea plants from the Ria) to help their crops grow. To collect the molico, they used wooden tools like a giant rake called an "ancinho", which they dragged along the bottom of the Ria.

The moliceiros (the people who did this job) pulled the moliço into the boat using the big rake. It was hard work and took lots of strength and patience!

But there was a big problem... The old boats were too tall, and the Ria was too shallow, it made the job really tricky.

So, the master boatbuilders of the Aveiro Region, that were true experts at building boats, had a clever idea: to create a brand-new boat designed especially for this job!

Take Note:

What is "moliço"?

It's a bunch of underwater plants, including seaweed, that grow at the bottom of lagoons and coastal waterways like the Ria.

How is a Moliceiro Boat born?

The Moliceiro Boat was specially created to sail in the Ria de Aveiro and collect molico.

Master boatbuilders built the boats by hand, using traditional tools.

They would cut many wooden planks to the right size and build the boat like a giant puzzle, fitting each piece together and holding it all in place with wooden pegs called "cavilhas".

Today, people don't collect moliço anymore but there are still a few masters who build moliceiros the oldfashioned way, in their shipyards.

Let's find out how?

DID YOU KNOW.

The Moliceiro Boat is about 15 meters long.

It has a flat bottom so it can glide smoothly over the shallow waters of the Ria de Aveiro.

And it has low sides to make it easier to scoop up the moliço!



Let's visit the places where moliceiros are made:



Monte Branco Shipyard-Museum **MURTOSA**

At the Museum, you can see old tools and mini models of moliceiros. Right next door, in the shipyard, you'll find Master José Rito working with traditional tools, shaping wood just like people did many years ago. Every boat takes time, care, and skill to build it's like a piece of history being made!.

Don't forget to look for Master José Oliveira, who's often at the shipyard or near the Ria. He's the one who brings color to the boats! This master painter decorates the moliceiros with funny phrases and scenes from everyday life.

> Cavilhas: Wooden pegs are like wooden nails, but hand-carved!

Pardilhó Shipyards **ESTARREIA**

The shipyards in the village of Pardilhó are famous for their wise and skilled hands - the master boatbuilders here still create Moliceiro Boats using just wood, simple tools, and lots of know-how.

Everything is done the old way: they use a special stick called a "pau-de-pontos" (measuring stick) to measure each part of the boat. Then they cut, shape, and join the pieces together with "cavilhas" (wooden pegs). This amazing knowledge has been passed down through generations!

Pau-de pontos: It's a long stick with all the boat's measurements marked on it.


Who Builds the boats? Meet the "mestres"!

The master boatbuilders, "mestres", know wood better than anyone! Some of them work in their own shipyards, while others build boats in places you can actually visit, like the Monte Branco Shipyard-Museum.

Today, there are only five master boatbuilders still working and just one "mestre pintor" (master painter)! Together, they keep the art of the Moliceiro Boats alive, passing down a tradition that sails through time!

Moliceiro Boat Ride

ROSSIO PIER - AVEIRO

Take a Moliceiro Boat ride through the canals of Aveiro. It's a great way to get a close-up look at the paintings on the boats. Each moliceiro has four hand-painted panels — two at the front (the bow "proa") and two at the back (the stern "ré").

These paintings show jobs, festivals, traditions, and religious images. Many are funny, and some are even a little cheeky!

The Master's signature:

On the rudder of a Moliceiro Boat, there's a small INSIGNIA detail that not everyone notices: the insignia!

It's a personal mark left by the master boatbuilder who built the boat. Like a signature, it stays on the boat forever.

Each master has their own insignia. It's usually a simple drawing made with geometric shapes and primary colors like red, blue, or yellow.

Next time you see a Moliceiro Boat, take a look at the rudder. Can you spot the insignia?

Activity:

What would your insignia look like?

Here's what to do:

- 1. Draw some simple geometric shapes like circles, triangles, and squares.
- 2. You can use a ruler and compass to help with your design.
- 3. Use bold, bright colors!

Remember:

An insignia is like a signature. It doesn't have to be complicated, it just has to be yours!

Mestre António Esteves

People call me "Pardaleiro", and I started working at a shipyard in Pardilhó when I was very young.

My insignia is a star with green and red sides.

Felisberto Amador

I started working in boatbuilding when I was just 14 years old, even though no one in my family did that kind of work.

My insignia has curved red and blue shapes. It kind of looks like a tennis ball!

Mestre Arménio Almeida

People know me as "Mestre Traça". It was my uncle who taught me everything I know. I started very young, I was only 11 years old!

My insignia looks like a flower, with blue, green, yellow, and red petals.

Mestre José Rito

I got my passion for boats from my father, and ever since I was little, I've been surrounded by them. I remember always being by the Ria!

My insignia has curved shapes in green and vellow. with red in the center.

Mestre Marco Silva

I'm the youngest of the masters, and I work in Torreira. Since I was little. I remember always having my feet in the water!

My insignia is simple: it's blue and vellow. divided into four equal parts.











What was life like on board?

The people who collected moliço — "moliceiros" — spent many days in a row on the boat, without going back home. They slept at the bow, wrapped in blankets, and woke up very early to work, sometimes even before the sunrise.

They spent long hours pulling moliço form the water with the "ancinho". And when they were hungry, they didn't leave the boat either! They cooked and ate on the boat. It was their home, kitchen, and shelter all in one.

Today, no one lives on a Moliceiro Boat anymore. But remembering what life was like helps us understand just how important these boats were for the people of Ria de Aveiro.

the small space where the moliceiros used to sleep is called the "bow castle" (castelo da proa).

Take Note:

The Moliceiro Boat was not only a place of work or a way to earn a living. It was also a second home.





5 Eel Stew

MURTOSA, ÍLHAVO, AVEIRO OU ESTARREJA

The eel was an easy fish to catch in the Ria de Aveiro. That's why fishermen often cooked eel stew right on board the moliceiro.

This dish was born out of the hard life on the boat, and it later became one of the most traditional meals of the region.

Today, you can taste it in many restaurants along the Ria, especially in **Murtosa**, **Ílhavo**, and **Aveiro**.

6 Ílhavo Maritime Museum

In this museum, you'll find the "Ria Room", where you can discover how the Ria de Aveiro was, for many years, an important part of family life.

In this room, you'll learn about the knowledge and traditions connected to the Ria. Look at the boats and old tools, and imagine what life was like back then.

But there's even more to explore!

The museum has an aquarium full of live codfish, a boat you can visit inside, secrets of the big fishing voyages, and sea stories hidden in every corner.

Roll up your pants, let's step into the Ria!

The Ria de Aveiro is not a river nor a sea — it's a **lagoon**. That means it's a place where saltwater from the sea mixes with freshwater from the rivers, creating an environment full of life. On its banks grow plants like reeds, bulrushes, and samphire. At the bottom, there are seaweeds and water plants that form the moliço. The lagoon is also home to many birds such as seagulls, herons, and flamingos, and to animals like otters, bats, fish, and amphibians.



BICO PIER - MURTOSA

Here, the ride is not through the city canals but through the quiet and natural areas of the Ria de Aveiro. On board a Moliceiro Boat, you'll sail along canals surrounded by small islands covered in plants.

During this ride, you can really feel the special connection between the



This walking trail goes through the village of Pardilhó, where you can find some shipyards. Here, freshwater flows into the land through small channels called "esteiros".

Along the way, you can spot salt marshes, which are wetland areas home to many birds, like herons and flamingos.

AVEIRO

In this landscape between the sea and the Ria, you'll find dunes, salt marshes, forests, and lagoons where nature is protected and many birds and small animals make their home.

The Interpretation Center of the São Jacinto Dunes Nature Reserve organizes guided walks along the Green Discovery Trail, where you can learn about the plants and animals that live here

At the Center, you can also see a special exhibition of miniature Moliceiro Boats.




Land ahead! Let's head to the pier!

The pier was the meeting place for moliceiro boatmen and farmers.

When farmers needed moliço for their fields, they went to the pier and made a deal with the moliceiro, just like placing an order! They would agree on the amount, and then pay with money or sometimes with vegetables from their gardens.

This way, the moliceiro already knew how much moliço to collect from the Ria. When the boat was full, he would return to the pier to unload it. Then, the moliço was taken from the pier to the fields in carts pulled by oxen, tractors didn't exist back then!



farmers used to order the number of moliço boats they needed!

And each boat could carry up to 5 tonnes of moliço. That's as heavy as 5 chubby cows!



Folssas Novas Pier

This was one of the busiest piers used by moliceiro boatmen in the Ria de Aveiro. Today, it's the starting point of a wooden walkway with views over the River Boco, where you can spot birds and plants.

It's also where the Moliceiro Festival takes place. Don't miss it!

The festival fills the Ria de Aveiro with joy music and tradition. This celebration has taken place every year since 1984, keeping the history of molico and the Moliceiro

It all begins with a colourful parade of Moliceiro Boats sailing along the **Boco River** to the pier. Then, a traditional auction of moliço and junco (reeds) is recreated, just like it used to happen many years ago, here, in the Folssas Novas Pier!

11 Bico Pier

MURTOSA

Cais do Bico was one of the busiest spots in the Ria, where moliço, salt and even building materials were unloaded. Here, you'll find the Moliceiro Monument — don't forget to take a photo!

Before the Varela Bridge was built, this was also the place where people crossed by boat to reach Torreira.

Boats alive.
